TOUR OF SMITH COLLEGE ARCHIVES AND SOPHIA SMITH COLLECTION

**Wednesday, January 7, 2009, 10:00 a.m. - Noon
Level A, Smith Alumnae Gymnasium**

The Sophia Smith Collection is an internationally recognized repository of archives, manuscripts, photographs, and periodicals in women's history. It was founded in 1942 to be the college library's distinctive contribution to Smith's mission of educating women. The Collection today consists of over 8000 linear feet of material documenting the historical experience of women in the United States and abroad from the colonial era to the present. Cheryl Redmon, Director of the Collection, will present a talk and a 20-minute film, *Creating Women's History*. We will also have a presentation by College Archivist Nanci Young, who will explain the riches to be found in the Smith College Archives. Attendees will then be free to delve into any materials of particular interest.

The Smith College Archives and Sophia Smith Collection reading room are on Level A of Alumnae Gymnasium. The wheelchair-accessible entrance is through Neilson Library. There is also an entrance close to Green Street.

There is no charge for this visit. Following the tour, interested members of the group can purchase lunch at the Campus Center or the Green Street Café (reservations recommended).

The directors of the Asian Arts and New World Theater programs at UMass will use slides and recordings to present previews of their spring offerings. These programs afford audiences an opportunity to view the world through the arts of non-Western cultures.

Ranjana Devi's programs focus on Asian countries. She will highlight spring programs including: the 500-year-old Awajii Puppet Theater, that will perform at UMass on February 28. This theater is the cradle for all other Japanese theater forms. She will also discuss the National Acrobats of China who will perform on March 9, undertaking gravity-defying balancing acts and spine-bending contortions in stunts such as foot juggling and plate spinning.

New World Theater is a regional theater with a national reputation that serves to educate, enliven and empower a diverse broad-based audience. Andrea Asaf will introduce:

“I Land,” which will be presented on February 11, a hilarious, defiant and transcendent program in which a hula dancer searches for meaning in a post-modern world.

“Project 2050,” April 2, examines local and global issues in a high-energy, original performance that addresses issues of race, social equity and power as performers create a new future on stage.

“Americaville,” April 30, the last performance, is a cross-disciplinary bilingual exploration of what it means to be American in a post-9/11 world.

THE MORTIMER RARE BOOK ROOM

Martin Antonetti, Curator of Rare Books has offered to spend an hour or two with us in the Mortimer Rare Book Room in the Neilson Library at Smith College. This remarkable collection, all of it used regularly by Smith students and faculty, includes works from all periods, – cuneiform tablets to contemporary artists' books – in all subject areas, from ancient history to zoology. Two jewels of the collection are the literary papers of Virginia Woolf and Sylvia Plath. There are 80 incunabula – books printed before 1500. This story of how these books were printed is fascinating. Everything in the room is of compelling interest, and Martin's impressive knowledge and experience enhances every piece. He is also a talented teacher of such courses as The Art and History of the Book. He refers to his field as "the archeology of books." Last year's presentation took us up to the invention of the printing press. Martin will continue the story this year. Even if you missed last year's tour, this one is guaranteed to enthrall you.

The Mortimer Rare Book Room is located on the third floor of the Neilson Library.
